But it is important to reflect that there is also a bigger picture. Of course that picture is much larger than we can imagine, embracing other faith communities too.

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the Trustees and volunteers of the Community Emergency Foodbank (CEF), I would be very grateful if you would pass on our thanks to the congregation of Wheatley URC for their generous support that we have enjoyed this year both financially and by way of food donations. Your church has donated over 400 items of food since April last year, as well as giving generously during your Harvest Festival.

There has been much publicity recently about the huge rise in the number of Food banks that have opened all over the country, almost exclusively run by church communities. You will have read of attempts to “politicise” food banks. Despite media pressure to comment, CEF chooses to not to speculate as to the reasons for food poverty. Suffice it to say that they are complex. We doubt that any government of any stripe could devise a benefits system that catered for the many hazards that afflict families: debt, desertion, alcohol addiction, gambling, divorce and imprisonment amongst them. The fact is that the demand for CEF’s services is constant. In 2015 CEF fed circa 3000 people. Without the generous support and encouragement of the churches, businesses and individuals, CEF could do little to help.

Having enjoyed the generosity of Nielsen UK, who have provided free warehouse space for us over the past 3 years, they are selling their site on the London Rd and we are having to move. The exciting news is that we have been able to purchase a purpose built portable unit which will be installed at St Francis Church, Hollow Way at the end of January. That will make the storage and distribution of food much easier and more efficient.

In March last year we opened our CEF café for a third day at Littlemore Baptist Church on a Thursday. After a slow start, the café there is now receiving more referrals and we are grateful for the enthusiastic volunteers who meet there every Thursday.

We would like to wish all our supporters a Happy New Year.

MINUTES of the CHURCH MEETING, 10th JANUARY 2016

Chair: Robert Harding

1. Apologies: Malcolm & Wendy Benson, Laurence & Peter Devlin, Angela & Rob Holdaway, Barbara Joiner, Pauline Shelley, Andy & Elizabeth Walkey

2. Minutes of last meeting: The Minutes of the meeting of 8th November 2015 were accepted and signed as a true record. There were no matters arising.

3. Pastoral Care Plus. News and concerns about members and friends were shared.

4. Ministry Team Reports

i) Elders – a) Vacancy up-date: Revd Carla Grosch-Miller, minister of St Columba’s and Cumnor, will be stepping down at the end of March which gives more flexibility to the situation in the Oxford area. The Elders had met with Revd Duncan Wilson who is helping us work through our period of vacancy. He explained that our choice is either to wait for a minister scoped at 50% or to appoint an Interim Minister for a limited time, at most until the end of 2017. After further explanation, the latter option was commended to the meeting by the elders for consideration. The Interim Minister would take on a set of specified tasks on behalf of the church, with maximum 50% scoping, although this is open to negotiation. The elders have appointed a Vacancy Committee comprising Robert Harding, Malcolm Benson, Phyllis Williams, Colin Thompson and Ellen Webster and would welcome another member from the congregation. Duncan Wilson has been in conversation with Revd Pauline Main, current minister of Marston and Summertown URCs, as she has expressed an interest in discussing our Interim vacancy. A meeting is scheduled for 8th February between Duncan Wilson, Pauline Main and our Vacancy Committee to explore this further. Within the next 2 weeks the Mission Statement and draft Pastorate Profile will be circulated to all members plus Pauline Main. It was stressed that Pauline Main would remain living in her manse in Oxford and the Wheatley manse would continue to be rented out. The meeting was in favour of pursuing the possibility of Pauline Main becoming our Interim Minister. The latest version of the Mission Statement was presented and approved by those present and thanks were expressed to all who have worked on it.

b) Annual Theme: The elders proposed the theme of “Journeying” for the coming year and this was accepted.

ii) Worship – The team is making plans for Easter and Holy Week. An LEP service is scheduled for 31st January, when the preacher will be Fr Dusham Cros. The search for a preacher for the Church Anniversary is on-going. The meeting was reminded that the booklet of individual “Faith Journeys” is available to borrow and people are encouraged to offer to describe their own faith journeys during a future service.

iii) Communications - The team are compiling guidelines for submission of electronic items for the newsletter. Six people have offered to write the Pastoral Letter for inclusion in the monthly newsletter and more would be appreciated. The outside noticeboard has been re-organised to give more prominence to posters of up-coming events and/or to include posters of organisations that the church supports. An attempt is being made to make the hall tidier for all users. More training is scheduled in the use of the AV equipment.

iv) ACE – A guest speaker will participate in the service of 14th February. A friend of Sybil Beaton’s is to speak on ‘The Three Faiths Forum’ during April. Revised dates were announced for the 4 discussion evenings on “Victory and Peace or Justice and Peace”: Feb 29th and March 7th, 14th and 21st. A course entitled “Journalling the Journey” is planned for October. Colin Thompson has been asked to present a further session on hymnody. A “Religious Question Time” evening is in the early stages of planning.

v) Finance – The Christmas Day collection amounted to £190 for the Refugee Crisis Appeal. The recipients of charitable donations for 2015 had been listed in the recent newsletter and it is possible that a further amount will be added once the year’s accounts are finalised.

vi) Care for the World – The team will meet soon to prepare plans for Fairtrade Fortnight, 29th February to 13th March.

vii) Hospitality – Catherine Harding reported that the oven has sustained damage beyond repair, so a new gas cooker has been ordered at a total cost of around £1800, including installation and removal of the old model. People are invited to donate towards this cost in the next 2 weeks by means of the blue envelopes at the back of the church. Attendees of both lunch clubs would also be invited to contribute.

5. Christian Partners - WAC Committee will be meeting soon to make plans for the Lent soup lunches, and possibly Lent meditations.

"Bi-blog" by Laurence Devlin

Humour is a very personal thing. For example, I can't understand anyone not liking the comedian Billy Connolly or the sitcom Citizen Kahn as they leave me belly-aching from laughter, while other people next to me roll their eyes at my bad taste in comedy... But then Father Ted, Mrs Brown or Benny Hill leave me totally cold so "chacun son gout."

The Hebrew Bible of course is not generally regarded as a humorous book – a truism if ever there was one! - and yet, as it contains the whole range of human situations, reactions and feelings, it also contains funny situations and humorous remarks. But humour does not always travel well, in time or space. The Bible was written a very long time ago in a language strange to most of us and in a culture totally different from ours so we often miss the cues. Also humour is often quickly "dated": I use to laugh a lot at "Fawlty Towers" when it first came out but I don't any longer as I feel it has really passed its sell-by date. And of course, we're conditioned by the whole "not-a-humorous-book" approach when we deal with the Biblical text.

I believe however that the person who recorded the death of King Jehoram in 2 Chronicles 21:20 by writing "He passed away, *to no one's regret*" did not lack a pinch of dry humour ... And what about David in 1 Samuel 21:15-16 who pretends to be insane before Achish, king of Gath, to avoid being returned to Saul. Achish says to his servants: "Am I so short of madmen that you have to bring this fellow here?"... I don't know about you but I find the

remark quite funny! I also really enjoy Balaam's conversation with his donkey (Numbers 22: 21-30) as I can't believe that the words "Am I not your own donkey? Have I been in the habit of doing this to you?" were written with a straight face! Proverbs, of course, is a goldmine of humour, not all of it very politically correct: "Like a gold ring in a pig's snout is a beautiful woman who shows no discretion" (11:22)... oops! And then what about Sarah laughing at the renewed sexual power of her husband age 99 when he was "as good as dead" in that department, (according to Hebrews 11:11-12) and then arguing with God whether or not she laughed: is there a better example of quirky humour when the joke is about laughing? Finally, dare I mention the episode in Judges 3:12-30 of the assassin Ehud plunging a dagger into the morbidly obese King Eglon causing a not so pleasant "gut reaction" ... if you pardon the pun!

There are many other examples but suffice to say that as the inspired Word of God comes to us through human voices and humour is part of what it is to be human, we should not be surprised that many of the biblical writers make use of the funny side of things too. If some play on words will always escape us because of the Hebrew language barrier, we can still appreciate satirical situations where inflated egos reveal their true selves in their bad temper, their vanity and their incompetence. None more so than in **the Book of Esther** where the author makes great use of irony, sarcasm, hyperboles and exaggerations in what turns out to be *a farce with a message*: Esther's comic aspects are not contained in a few jokes or in some witty repartees but in a "comic of situation" showing up men behaving badly.

Traditionally the story of Esther is remembered (or not as the case may be!) by Christians as one of only two books of the Hebrew Bible that does not explicitly mention God (the second one being the Song of Songs...). May be it is for that reason that it is rarely, if ever, read in church – never mind preached on - whereas in Judaism, the heroine Esther is at the centre of the festival of Purim, the merriest of all Jewish celebrations when people spend the day in a carnival atmosphere giving presents to each other, eating, singing, dancing, masquerading, drinking and merry-making. The celebration is joyful because it commemorates the Persian Jews being saved from extermination thanks to young Esther. Furthermore the Rabbis also saw something in the text of Esther that escaped Christian leaders: Calvin did not include the book in any of his commentaries and Luther considered it a "great

For forty-four years Ian Davis has been studying such threats in about fifty countries, advising and training officials in UN Agencies, the European Union, Governments and NGO's on effective Disaster Risk Management. Ian Davis, a recent member of St Mary's church, is Visiting Professor in Disaster Risk Management in Kyoto, Lund and Oxford Brookes Universities. He was trained as an architect and his PhD in UCL was on *Shelter following Disasters*. In 1996 he became the first British citizen to be awarded the United Nations Sasakawa Prize for his Contributions to International Disaster Prevention. He has been a board member of four NGOs including Tearfund and was one of the founders of Traidcraft, which became a leading Fairtrade organization. He is the author or editor of over 20 books on Architecture, Disaster Risk Management and Development.

WHEATLEY AREA CHURCHES LENT COURSE 2016 DISASTERS: A CHALLENGE TO FAITH?

All too often our TV screens and newspaper headlines are filled with distressing images of disaster. We can recall a devastating earthquake in Nepal, or nearer to home floods in Somerset and Cumbria, possibly resulting from climate change and desperate refugee families escaping from Syria and North Africa.

enemy" as it contained, according to him, too much "judaizing" and "pagan naughtiness." As great as the two Reformers were, I am afraid they totally missed the point!

Ahasuerus, the king of Persia, the greatest empire of the time, is portrayed as an ineffectual, ostentatious, debauched buffoon who spends his time drinking, partying and womanizing: at the start of the book he throws a preposterously lavish party which lasts six months (!) culminating in a scene where the drunken king summons Queen Vashti to parade, in the nude, in front of his courtiers. When she refuses, he banishes her in a fit of uncontrollable rage. But then he feels lonely so his courtiers suggest that a harem of young virgins gathered from the four corners of the empire would brighten things up nicely, thank you very much... each night a different girl will come to him and the one who will satisfy him best will be the new queen! Before the young women can enter the King's chamber however, they must undergo a beautifying regime *for an entire year!* The whole thing would be infuriating and totally ludicrous if it was not so much over the top and therefore funny! Interestingly Esther wins the contest not only through her charms but also through her wits and her determination, cleverly manipulating a weak and greedy king.

In any case the whole book portrays the King as a vain playboy who lacks moral compass, prevaricates, does not properly govern and produces silly edicts that he cannot abolish, even if it was him who produced them in the first place! He is basically a ridiculous hedonist that you can only laugh at. His advisers, it has to be said, are not much better, especially the Grand Vizier Haman who swells with excessive self-importance in spite of having achieved nothing of any value and who is only hungry for honours he does not deserve. It seems therefore obvious that the essence of the book is highly satirical as it pokes fun at the Persian elite, mocking the decadence of empire, the absurdity of human pretensions and the vanity of useless leaders: Humour has always been a very effective weapon of the powerless and the oppressed. All this of course is in stark contrast with the Biblical tradition of the "good life" and of Wisdom which is the only righteous way to achieve human flourishing.

Read the book if you never have, it is a good story full of funny twists and turns!
