This month's painting of a stone circle on the Orkneys is done from memory and is painted over the original which was completed soon after our visit seven years ago. Repainting this was an enriching experience as it gave me opportunity to reflect again on the mystery and antiquity of this remote beautiful island with its people.

Memory is a fascinating thing. Bringing a past experience into the present moment and choosing to relive it and to reflect upon it can be very valuable. Then what you have gained from it can be applied to the present and enrich the way you live.

Memory is also a difficult thing. Sometimes it lets us down and frustrates us. We search for objects or words and get cross with ourselves when we cannot bring them to mind. Then we find that there are things we wish we could forget – the angry words or spiteful actions we have given or received – that chip that remains firmly and heavily on our shoulder.

I would love to find a way for us to help each other let go of damaging memories. Sharing them in confidence with a friend is a beginning, but how do we move on? We all can think of times when we listen to someone's unhappy or angry memories for the umpteenth time and just wish we could help them to let go.

It is difficult to erase a bad memory when we have allowed ourselves to harbour it, but easier to deal with something at the time. Every day we need to consider the consequences of our words and actions, not only on others but also on ourselves. We can learn from those who have the gift of being able to disagree or point out an injustice with calmness and good humour. But I also think that if we train our minds to recall the best in our past experiences, and to share the good and the uplifting with others we will be more contented people. Paul wrote to the Philippians: whatever is true, honourable, just, pure, pleasing, commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.

As always the news seems to be full of sensational, headline grabbing issues, chosen by newspaper or television news editors to get our attention. As I write this, the main stories involve the so called 'Panama Papers', David Cameron's investments and tax affairs and who was Justin Welby's father? By the time you are reading this, the news that we are fed will have moved on no doubt.

When I was asked if I had seen the front page of The Observer one Sunday, I was reminded how much the news is fed to us. Spread across the front page was all the detail of our Prime Minister's tax affairs. (He was the PM then, and probably still is!). Tucked away in one little corner, so as you would hardly notice, was an item about Burundi. Are we aware of the level of violence against the civilian population there? Did we know that approximately 230,000 people have been displaced in the last year? Did we know that another president is clinging to power at any cost? There are, of course, countless other stories which are never or hardly ever brought to our attention.

The point I wish to make is not about the press; people just doing their job, selling the news they think most people want to hear. What I want to ask myself, and you if you wish, is how much of an effort do I put into discovering the news that those with political power and influence don't wish me to hear? Not only that, how should I react to it?

As church secretary I receive all sorts. Very recently a pack arrived in the post from 'Global Justice Now', but significantly sponsored by, among others: Christian Aid, Jubilee Debt Campaign, One World Week, Trade Justice Movement, World Justice and Peace and our own Commitment for Life. A significant group I hope you will agree.

This pack was about TTIP, 'The Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership'. Ever heard of it? Know what it might mean or do? I am very far from being an expert, but these charities and campaigning groups believe that if this TTIP agreement goes ahead, then all poorer countries will be at an even greater disadvantage in the global market-place than they are already. You might like to find out more, easily done on the internet.

In the Autumn I am hoping we can hold three Bible study sessions related to this topic. I will let you have dates as soon as we have them.

To finish, here is a prayer written by Sue Cooper for CAFOD:

*God of Compassion,
You look down on the global marketplace and see the scales tipped by
subsidies and tariffs. The unsold milk in Jamaica draining away wasted.
The maize in Mexico rotting on the stalk. And while the rich feast on the
proceeds of their sales, the poor count the cost of free trade.
God of Justice, call us to account. Inspire us, so that we may cast off our
complacency and apathy, and joining hands with people home and abroad,
we may make a stand for justice and righteousness, for all who dwell on the
earth. Amen.*

Discernment Process for choosing Elders
Church Newsletter May 2016**

Introduction

The fundamental body by which we in the URC govern ourselves is the Church Meeting. All members of the church are entitled to attend and vote at Church Meeting.

As was the case in the earliest days of the church, we choose some of our number to work on our behalf, ensuring worship is held regularly and properly, providing pastoral care to members of the church meeting and friends of the church, and taking care of the resources of the church (money, building and so on).

These people we call Elders and we believe their role is sufficiently important in the life of the church, to hold them in that esteem which we recognise by using a process of 'ordination'.

How we choose our Elders is important

The process, which is designed to encourage all of us to take part, will be the same as last year and focuses on discernment and a sense of call.

The whole Church community has been challenged to consider whether they have the gifts, talents and skills to enable them to fulfil the role of Elder and all are encouraged and given time to take part in the discernment process.

The process for 2016 is as follows:

MAY

- During the month of May, the congregation will be invited to consider prayerfully who they think God may be calling to the role of

Gift Aid Scheme

Many of you are aware of (and use) the Gift Aid Scheme, for your regular giving to the Church.

Under this scheme, the Church can claim from the Tax Authorities, 25p for every £1 given. This forms a significant part of our annual income .

The main regulation for this scheme, is that the person making the donations, must pay at least an equivalent sum in personal tax during any particular tax year, to the amount being claimed on all gift aided giving. (e.g. Total donations- £500; the claim under gift aid will be £125. You must therefore pay at least £125 in tax during any particular tax year).

I would mention, however, that anyone using this scheme must let me know if they are concerned that their annual tax paid will not cover the amount that the Church can claim on their giving.

Under current ruling, any excess claim under the Gift Aid scheme, can result in the Tax Authorities reclaiming the difference from the individual concerned.

Elder for the next three years. Any who worship with us are part of this process, and they may convey their suggestions by speaking to the Minister or a current serving Elder, or by completing a nomination slip. This slip does not need the signature of the person being nominated; they are anonymous, and individuals may put forward their own names if they wish. The only criterion is that the person named must be a member of Wheatley URC.

JUNE

- The deadline for nominations will be the beginning of June. At the June Elders' Meeting, the names will be shared and time will be spent reflecting on individual gifts and talents and where these might fit with the needs and mission of the Eldership. For the time being, the names will not be publicised. Elders will hold these names in prayer during this month whilst all church members and friends will be asked to pray for the process of discernment.
- The Church Secretaries will contact all those nominated early in the month and ask them to prayerfully consider their call. When approached, they will be told of their discerned gifts, talents and experiences. It is recognised that many of us share our gifts and talents in a number of ways through our home and work life, and through voluntary work outside the church. Some may feel they cannot take on the role of Elder at this time. However, it is important that anyone who has been identified by this discernment process has time to reflect on whether they are indeed being called to the role of Elder. In time for the July Elders Meeting, they will be asked whether they are willing for their names to go forward.

JULY

- At their July meeting, Elders will then prayerfully consider the names brought forward, and will, with God's help, discern a number of people who they feel are being called at this time.
- The list of names of those discerned to have a call, and who are willing to stand, will be brought to the July Church Meeting. During the months of July and August, each Elder will contact those in their pastoral group to ask them for any thoughts they may have. In this way the whole church will share in the prayerful discernment of our Elders over the summer.

SEPTEMBER

- At their September meeting, Elders will once again prayerfully reflect on the list of names. Using a simple ranking system, Elders will then indicate who they believe are being called. In our experience, it will be clear at this time that a number of names will rise to the top of the list. The Minister or Church Secretaries will then speak to those who are discerned not to be called at this time.
- At the Annual Church Meeting in September members will be invited to consider the names of those whose call to Eldership has been discerned, and, after an opportunity for prayerful reflection, to approve them.

The two serving Elders due to complete their current terms in September 2016, are Ann Bettess and Malcolm Benson. We are very grateful for all that they have contributed during their time as elders and in Malcolm's case as Church Secretary as well.

I am a traveller on the earth stepping and balancing over roots and branches along broken bridge over puddle and storm drain.

I am a traveller on the earth smelling and tasting seduced by pepper, mangostani and cinnamon sipping tamarind juice with lemon slice.

I am a traveller on the earth, feeling and burning, warm air caresses my skin, hot sun burns my back, the night air buzzes with life.

I am a traveller on the earth, sheltering and waiting, through storm and heat, through mud and rain, in darkness and in sunshine.

I am a traveller on the earth, giving and taking, praying and hoping, seeing pleading eyes and outstretched hands, unfinished buildings and donkey carts.

I am a traveller on the earth, listening and learning, to refugees' stories, grieving parents, the man with AIDS.

I am a traveller on the earth sharing, rejoicing, a new-born child, a music scholarship.

I am a traveller on the earth listening and learning through smiles and greetings.

Autumn Harvest – a message from Sustainable Wheatley

For a long time Sustainable Wheatley (the group which runs the Swap Shops) has wanted to do something to prevent the waste of fruit left to rot on trees in this village.

Last autumn we launched an initiative to gather and distribute surplus fruit around Wheatley and even had a go at pressing and pasteurising our own fruit juice. We had huge fun, learned a lot, and plan to do even more in the future.

This year we have been entrusted with a long term loan of equipment needed to press fruit and pasteurise the juice. That means it will be possible to hold a "Juiceday" when Wheatley residents can bring their own fruit for juicing and bottling.

So now the call goes out for help in the following ways:

Trees for picking – such as apples, pears, quince: if you need help in picking your fruit trees, please let us know. You can keep the fruit, or share it with us.

Hands for picking – for a few hours in the sunshine.

Help with fruit distribution - last year we gave some to schools and playgroups, a nursing home, the WI, and put some out in boxes along the High Street. Do you know of other groups who could use the fruit?

Bottles for juicing – screw-top wine bottles, preferably with labels removed.

Help with cider making – that's Tim Blightman's idea.

Help with planning – can you help with ideas, energy or organisation?
