Annual General Meeting

Worship Ministry Team

Revd Pauline Main

The Worship Team met three times during the year. Pauline Main took over from Colin Thompson as convenor. Many thanks to Colin for his leadership in that role, and for his continuing guidance and wisdom as a member of the Team.

Following the inspirational worship led by potter Andrew Hazelden, the church agreed to commission him to create a baptismal bowl for us. Laurence and Colin took the lead in working with Andrew on the design, and a beautiful bowl has been made and is ready for use. Plans are now in hand for a student from Rycotewood College, which teaches furniture making, to design a wooden stand for the new bowl, and his tutor has visited the church to see how it will look in situ.

Acting upon a suggestion by Peter Devlin, a number of “sermon stormin’ sessions have been held after morning service. These are an opportunity for members of the congregation who wish, to stay after coffee and discuss the sermon with the preacher. The sessions have been interesting and helpful.

Services of Holy Communion have been shared by Colin and Pauline, Colin leading on the first Sunday and Pauline on the third. Next year they will swap, so that they don’t find themselves always preaching on the same readings! In order to facilitate this, Summertown has kindly agreed to move their communion service to the third Sunday.

Lent and Easter

Pauline introduced a Liturgy for Lent, used for several years at Summertown. Each week items relating to the Passion story were brought forward, accompanied by a short reading and prayer. This formed a good focus, though next time it would be good to have a small cross placed beside the items. The large wooden cross was decorated as usual on Easter Sunday.

The usual series of Breakfast Meditations were held during Holy Week, with leaders from St Mary’s, Wheatley Community Church and ourselves. These varied in style, and overall were well attended by members of our churches.

In appreciation of these two evenings members donated, over and above expenses, £20 for use of the URC Hall, £45 for The Oxford Foodbank, £55 for The Porch Day Centre and £115 for The Disaster Emergency Committee’s work in The Yemen.

The History

This eclectic group of people originally came together back in 1998 to share their common interest in jazz music as a vehicle for raising money for the Wheatley URC Restoration Project. The URC Treasurer had put up stakes of £10 and challenged each member of the congregation to go away and make it grow! I invested mine in cakes and wine and invited jazz lovers to pay £10 each to join me for a series of evenings to play board games whilst listening to jazz. Sometimes we would have a speaker on a particular aspect of the music and on one occasion we invited local professional jazz musician, George Haslam to demonstrate the technique of improvisation and then, with two musicians from Wheatley Park School (Roger Simmonds and James Whitworth), they “jammed” together. As the size of Busters’ membership increased we outgrew our lounge and ended up in the Church Hall. So “Buster’s On The Hill” became “Buster’s Off The Square”. (Buster, incidentally, was the resident cat who detested jazz and the people who invaded his house and who was never present after the first arrival!) For new members, lifetime membership is £10, which goes to Wheatley URC general funds.

It waned for a few years, but then reformed more recently, by popular request and now usually meets at the Church Hall when there is a fifth Friday evening in the month. At these evenings we usually raise money by donation, for an appropriate, named charity, but after first deducting a donation to the URC for use of the hall and the costs of wine and other beverages consumed. Finger food for the evening is provided by attendees on a “bring and share” basis.

New jazz loving members are welcome. Join us just for an evening or for life!

In September 2016 we met in the URC Hall and as an antedote to our sunny summer evening in the garden in July, we enjoyed an evening of Autumnal themed music ranging from Acker Bilk to Paul Desmond (two versions of "Autumn Leaves") with some Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Eddie Condon, Ken Colyer, The MJQ, Coleman Hawkins, Woody Herman, Humphrey Lyttleton, Johnny Mathis, Charlie Parker, Lonnie Donegan, Lawson/Haggart Band, Benny Goodman, and Joshua Rifkin playing Scott Joplin's Maple Leaf Rag, on the way!

In December 2016 we went for an evening of "Blues" music, exploring it's history and development and it's links with jazz and other American music genres. During the evening Wendy & Malcolm shared with us highlights of their "recent" musical trip down the Mighty Mississippi River on a steamboat. We finished the evening with a tribute to the recently late, great Leonard Cohen and his music and poetry.

Christmas

Christmas services went well and according to plan. The Carol service was well attended, but there was a clash of dates with St. Mary's crib service which we shall try to avoid this year. A helpful addition to the usual Christmas programme was held on 22nd December, a service for "The Longest Night", organised and led by Laurence, particularly aimed at people who find Christmas a difficult time, either due to bereavement or loneliness. It was much appreciated by those who attended, but more publicity is needed next year, to help people understand the nature and timing of the service.

Shared services

There was a shared service with St Mary's at the URC in October, and a rather hastily-arranged service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January. Sadly, it proved impossible to organise the proposed shared service at Pentecost, but we hope this will be possible next year with better forward planning.

Elements of worship

The involvement of members of the congregation in leading prayers of thanksgiving and intercession is much valued. However, the Worship Team realise that people can find creating these prayers difficult, and agreed to hold a prayer workshop for those interested, eventually arranged for Sunday 20th August.

As part of our programme of looking at the elements of worship, we had a discussion about music in worship. The contribution of Frances Simpson in providing our organ music is much appreciated: many thanks to her for her thoughtful contributions in the "incidental" music and postlude, as well as in the hymns. The use of music (or silence) during the distribution of communion was mentioned, and Pauline agreed to try different options and canvass opinion. To date, quiet and reflective music, rather than singing or silence, seems to be what people find the most helpful.

And – we are also most grateful to the various creative folk in the church who enhance our worship in visual ways; Pauline Shelley with her artwork, and Allison Towner for the flowers deserve special mention, but there are others involved also. We are much blessed in having such a talented congregation.

Preaching rota

Many thanks to Laurence for her efficient organising of the preaching rota – something of a thankless task – and to all those who have led worship throughout the year. Especial thanks to our in-house lay preachers, Richard Bainbridge and Laurence herself.

Future plans – commemorating the Reformation

On 15th October Colin has arranged for Professor Henrike Lehnemann to give a talk on 'The music of the Reformation', followed by a shared lunch. It was suggested that in October Colin might use the sermon slot to give a brief history of the Reformation.

Secretaries' Report

I have decided to divide this year's report into two main sections. The first concentrating on all the new things which have happened in the past twelve months, and then all the issues we already have on our agenda for the future.

So, what are new things which we have achieved together in the last year? Just before Christmas Laurence led a 'Longest Night Service', a beautiful, quiet and meditative time together in the church. Hopefully this will be repeated, probably with a few minor adjustments, following a review of this first service. A month or so before this, in November, Pauline Shelley, (one has to distinguish these days!) and Bobbie, with the help of one or two others, mounted a 'Creative Day' in the hall and church. The variety of activities on offer was amazing, and all who attended were bowled over. In our attempts to follow the URC's environmental policy and become a more 'eco-friendly' church, we applied for and gained 'Eco-Church Bronze Award'

I am sure that Wheatley URC could do more to support the work of Traidcraft, both in promoting self-reliance within poor communities through our sales, and in campaigning for trade justice. However, I am not the person to lead this, as I feel stale and jaded. If someone else would take overall responsibility I would be happy to assist if desired.

Maintenance Ministry Team

The team members for this year have been Chris Shelley (convenor), Tony Barry, Malcolm Benson and Bob Webster.

The gas boiler which was only a month old at last year's report, has been running trouble freeduring the year and should prove much more efficient than the old boiler.

Following concerns that the back door was sometimes being locked when the hall was in use, to prevent unknown access (not recommended under fire safety regulations), a second movement detector was fitted just inside the door. Second warning lights have been fitted alongside the existing ones in the hall and at the rear of the Sanctuary in the view of the stewards.

In order to improve the look of the area, the corridor from the back door round to the door into the hall was cleaned and repainted. A 'spring clean' was also carried out to the premises.

Quotations were obtained from three stonework companies for repairs to the north wall (High Street) of the Sanctuary. These ranged from approximately £4000 up to £12000, the main difference being the amount of stonework each considered should be replaced. After discussions and further advice, we decided to refer back to one of the firms for a re-quote, allowing for more stonework to be replaced. Unfortunately, this company had become insolvent and gone out of business. We are presently obtaining one further quotation, which hopefully should have been received by the time of the AGM. A decision will then be made as to which company we will instruct to carry out the work.

The Sanctuary floor is in need of being re-surfaced, as it has become quite badly worn and scratched. We are in the process of obtaining advice and a quotation, to see exactly what work needs to be done.

Many thanks to all who have carried out any items of work or maintenance during the past year. Your help is greatly appreciated.

Care for the World

This year we have been working with the Midcounties Co-Op who generously granted Wheatley URC £150 towards the cost of Fairtrade ingredients for the Pancake Breakfast at the end of Fairtrade Fortnight. We were also able to buy Fairtrade aprons for use in URC kitchen and other events 'to promote awareness of Fair trade in the local community'. Although a team effort, huge thanks go to Liz Walkey for tossing pancakes non-stop from 10am to 12noon. We do miss her and wish her well in her life in Leeds. Lucky Leeds!

As always on the first Friday in March, we celebrated the Women's World Day of Prayer in Wheatley, with women from all the other local churches and following a service this year from the Philippines. Ellen has again helped us draw this together, and we are looking forward to Moira Watson and Ann Hardiman co-ordinating next year.

We have continued our association with the Co-op as two of their staff gave time to help at the fete with the Fairtrade stall games, and all in the interests of community.

Both Christian Aid and the Community Emergency Foodbank nominally come under this ministry team. Christian Aid has been well supported by Lent lunches and house-to-house collections, and the regular food bank donations are much appreciated.

Another first this year was the close cooperation between ourselves and the local Co-op store with our fete, culminating in two of their staff helping us out for the whole afternoon. In addition to these new projects, we have gone through the last year with just one secretary, the first time for many years. This has worked, I think, with the help of several elders who have taken on different roles.

As for the future there are a number of important issues in the pipeline. We continue to be involved in discussions about the future of URC ministry in the Oxford area. Currently the plan is to develop a team of ministers to work with the seven churches, each having specific responsibility for named churches. This has particular relevance for us at Wheatley, as a meeting to review Pauline Main's interim ministry here, will take place in September. Her ministry with us is due to finish at the end of this year, however, if all parties are in agreement, then there is every possibility this can be extended. Work has continued in the background on plans to improve the facilities in our two back rooms. Detailed proposals will be available for all to see and discuss, hopefully during September or October. Another future project will hopefully see us build on the 'eco-friendly' progress we have made, all being well with the help of 'Sustainable Wheatley'.

On a more general note, we have had to say farewell to Andrew and Elizabeth Walkey and Liz Stewart, who have moved to pastures new, we wish them well and thank them for their contributions to the life of the church. Although she had moved away some time ago, Hazel Hull was still officially a member when she died a few months ago. She contributed a huge amount to our church over very many years and we remember her with great affection. I think it is important to express our thanks to all four of our regular worship leaders, Pauline, who has been with us for well over a year now, Laurence, the newest member of the team, as well as Colin and Richard. We are so blessed to have all these folk who challenge and stimulate us week after week. If I start to pick out other individual names it's hard to know where to stop, but what is so wonderful about our church is how so many contribute so much. However, had said that, I need to express my thanks to Ellen, without whose help and support I would have found the last year very demanding indeed. They have been downloaded a total of 23,655 times, an average of 131 times per sermon. This is an increase of 15% on last year.

The most popular sermon is still Turning the world upside down, by Tanya Stormo Rasmussen, Sunday, 21st October 2012, which has been downloaded 127 times in the last year.

Posters have been produced for the Fete, for Wheatley Area Churches Easter services, for One World Week. Every effort is made to keep notices tidy and up-to-date. We hope to be able to produce some more attractive large posters for general use in the coming year.

Audio-Visual System

Treasurer and Finance Ministry Team

The team members for the last year have been Chris Shelley, Bob Webster, Ann Hardiman and Christine Bainbridge.

The accounts for our financial year, 1st January – 31st December 2016 will be presented at the AGM on 17th September.

Although our weekly offerings decreased in 2016 (£29,809), compared with 2015 (£33,236) I am pleased to report that an increase was seen in the second half of the year and rather than the forecast decrease in the last report of 18%, the actual decrease was 10%. From the figures to date, it seems that our offerings for 2017 will be similar to 2016.

The Gift Aid receipts over the last few years have ranged from £6,100 to £6,700 (in 2015). I anticipate that the claim I will be making in the next couple of months for 2016, will be around £6000. At present, this decrease is not giving cause for concern, but it will be kept under review. Our main outgoing, as always, is to the URC Ministry and Mission (M&M), which for 2016 totalled £19,623. For 2017, this is £20,484. This payment goes towards the stipends of ministers in local parishes, Church related community workers, ministers working in special category posts and resource centres for learning. We are presently looking at the 2018 figure, which may increase by about 2%, although it will be based on the number of Church members we have.

Our cooker had to be replaced during 2016 at a cost of £1,842, but this cost was covered entirely by personal donations.

Another major expense was the replacement of the boiler, at a cost of just under £4,000.

Looking forwards, we have major expenditure in the repair of the High Street wall of the Sanctuary, and also the re-surfacing of the Sanctuary floor. (see Maintenance report)

We are in the process of switching our suppliers of gas and electricity to a 'greener' supplier through the 'Big Church Switch' initiative. Further information will be given at the AGM.

Earlier this year we had a talk from Peter Stevenson about the Oxfordshire Credit Union. The finance team will be meeting to discuss whether we feel that the Church should make an investment in this worthwhile cause. More information will follow.

We made donations to two major charitable appeals in 2016, Haiti and Yemen, as well as our usual charity giving decided by the team when they

met in November. Full details of the Charitable giving will be shown in the accounts.

If anyone would like to sign up to the Gift Aid scheme or would like further information, please let me know. There is no additional cost to you, and the main criteria is that you pay sufficient tax to cover the 25% of your annual giving, which we can claim back from HM Revenue and Customs in any one year. As you can see, it is an excellent way of increasing the Church's income.

I am obliged to remind those currently in the Gift Aid scheme, that if your tax position changes, so that the tax you pay will not cover the 25% of your annual giving that we claim back, you must please let me know.

Also, if you would like to join our offertory envelope scheme or pay your regular offering directly into the Church bank account, please let me know.

Finally, many thanks for your continued generous giving over the last twelve months.
