I can recall the magical feeling of being aware of the immediate way ahead – no distractions or distant views – just being in tune with life in the present moment.

So this month here is another mountain painting. As autumn turns to winter you might expect it to be bleak and cold, but instead this scene has a hot red underpainting. It's title is The Glaciers are Melting and it is a solemn reminder of global warming.

We are all too aware of the mountainous problems facing our leaders and politicians. They are far removed from first century Palestine yet Jesus spoke of moving mountains and the faith required to do the seemingly impossible.

As we rely on the knowledge of scientists to raise our awareness and the power of politicians to take major decisions, it is up to each one of us to try to live more economically, and to be open and experimental in our attempts to change.

We need people of courage to set examples of living in harmony with nature rather than exploiting it, and as we approach the Christmas period with its temptation to over indulge I wonder how courageous we can be to live more simply. Can we stand alongside those who have no choice but to cut back on their spending? Can we celebrate in true Christian style?

It seems to me that unhappiness results from wanting the beautiful view or way of life to continue unchanged, we need to be able to let go and be open to change. Faith is needed to continue moving forward when the distant view is obscured and all that remains is a bewildering mystery.

In addition to her mobility and balance being impaired, she is much slower at everyday tasks and in greater need of help. As a result I find myself 'waiting' and am gradually learning how to be more patient and not simply sit twiddling my thumbs. However patience does not equate with doing nothing, which, as Leo Tolstoy said is laziness. So what do I do?. Sometimes I find myself multitasking, trying to fit in another job. At other times I may be preparing for the next task or planning for the day ahead; at others exercising my brain with the day's crossword or sudoko. I am not great at meditating but increasingly find myself quietly reflecting on a visual image or something I have heard or read.

All of that is a preface to thoughts on Advent, a period of waiting. But what are we waiting for? Whilst not wishing to diminish the importance of Christ's birth in the Christian calendar, it is an event with which we are all familiar and excited anticipation of a birthday is I suspect inversely proportional to one's age. Advent is also a time of preparation but all too often this has more to do with ensuring we have ordered the turkey, put up the decorations or purchased the requisite number of presents. Christ's birth is certainly worthy of celebration but Advent is also a time for quiet reflection which can be swamped by all the excitement and 'business'.

I came across the following prayer during Advent last year, attributed to St Teresa of Avila, and I have often returned to it for quiet reflection. I share it with you as we wait and prepare for Christ's coming among us.

"May today there be peace within.

May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be.

May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith.

May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you.

May you be content knowing you are a child of God.

Let this presence settle into your bones, and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise and love.

It is there for each one of us."

May the light of the Christ child lead us to peace in our hearts, our homes, our country and His world.



### Advent Wreath 2022

When Theseus stood at the entrance to the labyrinth, he was armed with a sword and a clew, (ball of string). Ariadne gave him instructions to always walk forwards, never left or right and to go downhill. Theseus set out to slay the Minotaur; a half bull half human creature which had taken captive many young men and women.

We most likely remember this famous Greek myth from our school days and think of it when we encounter the word 'labyrinth'. Labyrinths were and are dangerous places. There is a risk of losing your way in the maze of passages and dying from hunger and thirst. In today's world, garden mazes are fun to enter and weave your way through, with dead ends making the puzzle more tricky but entertaining.

Unlike the familiar mazes and labyrinths of the past, and the present gaming world, labyrinths have been used by many cultures and religions to symbolise a spiritual journey or pilgrimage. Christians have used them in cathedrals for prayerful meditation since medieval times. There is a famous one on the floor of the Chartres Cathedral near Paris. These labyrinths are unicursal, meaning there is only one path leading to the centre and back out into the world.





The development of the seven circle labyrinth, meant that a cross was incorporated in the centre, providing it with a Christian symbol. The entrance represents birth, and the centre, God.

This Advent, we are incorporating a labyrinth in our wreath and decorations, as a focus for our prayers and meditations. Traditionally, each Sunday of Advent, we light a candle symbolising, Hope, Faith, Joy and Peace. In the centre is the Christ candle which is lit on Christmas Day to symbolise Christ coming into the world.

Theseus bravely fought and slayed the Minotaur with his sword. He set free the young men and women that were held captive before they were devoured by the monster. He then returned triumphantly from the labyrinth with the help of his string, to take the hand of Ariadne. (Only it didn't work out like that). Sadly, as he sailed back home, he forgot to change his sails from black to white to show his father he had been successful. His father, King Aegeus, jumped off the cliff to his death, in the belief that his son was dead. Such are the twists and turns of life!

As we stand at the entrance to the labyrinth, this Advent, what challenges will we face ahead? Climate change, rising energy bills, health problems....? The list is endless.

With God at the centre and our armour of Hope and Faith, and with Joy and Peace in our hearts, we ask God to show us His pathways.

The Howe Trust - Christmas Hamper Appeal

The Howe Trust is a local charity with responsibility of maintaining the land known as The Howe for the benefit of the local population. In addition, when money permits, we provide help for the most needy in our community. The Howe Trust Christmas Hamper Campaign supports the families of children in receipt of free school meals, who attend Wheatley C of E Primary, Wheatley Park and John Watson Schools.

2022 will be the 3rd year we will be running the initiative with almost 200 children being eligible for free school meals across the three schools. Many of the families are suffering from a reduction in universal credit alongside dramatically increased costs of basics such as food and fuel.

The hampers which will cost approximately £40 each provide all the ingredients needed to cook a full healthy Christmas dinner for 6 - including a fresh turkey crown, pigs in blankets, stuffing, fresh vegetables and Yule log or a vegetarian equivalent.

Needless to say, this initiative makes a huge difference to some of the poorest families in our community. In previous years grateful thanks were received from many of the recipients, with one mother writing that it "was their best Christmas present ever and had taught her sons something about the kindness of strangers".

It is anticipated that most of the costs of funding this campaign will be provided by the Howe Trust but we could not do it without financial contributions from individuals and sponsors.

A Good Read - SNIPPETS from past AGM Minutes

A selection from archived AGM Minutes will be included in the coming Newsletters. How some things change and other do not! [this is not intended as a historical record; comments in square brackets are added. *Ellen*]

1972

Revd Brock said it would grieve him even to think of leaving Wheatley, but the day may soon come – 10 years was a good round figure to finish on. It would be wise if Wheatley considered what Wheatley would do if and when the time arose. "Quite naturally we have heart strings pulling us towards the USA. We don't want to leave you in the lurch".

The Church secretary [Bruce Shepherd] replied that the whole Church would be sad to lose the Brocks and it would be a very sad day indeed when they left up Friday Lane for the last time.

[it would be another 25 years before that day arrived.]

1973

Revd Brock said it had been a difficult year for him and he had found he had run out of energy. The major disappointment was the B.Litt perhaps – tried for too much in too short a time, he said. An attempt might be made one day to write a book reconciling Marx and Froid [sic] and Christianity.

1974

Job Description for Church Secretary

The duties of church secretary are necessarily very different from those of a secretary in the commercial world. For apart from being responsible for all church correspondence and records, the job is more nearly akin to those of a manager of a commercial concern, except that a manager might get things done by command, the church secretary must do so by tactful request. He[!] must also be the minister's closest friend, confidant and adviser.

1978

Mr Brock referred to the discussion groups on a) Sexual Morality, b) Marriage, Divorce and Remarriage.... and two other topics for discussion during coming year 1) The National Front and its implications, 2) The denominational appeal for all church members to give 1% of their income to world development.

1979

Auditor's comments: 75% of the collection money comes from the people who covenant. Weekly giving (church membership 74) = 35p per member and cost to keep church going was £1 per member. The auditor asked that the church pay particular attention to the maintenance of the church fabric since only £28 was spent in the year ending.

Social Committee: a very busy year with a number of activities – some just for fund raising and some purely as social get-togethers. Pea and Pie Hallowe'en [!], slide evening, Christmas Bazaar, Barn Dance, Jumble Sales, Sunday teas on several occasions, Farewell Party, Spring Fete and a family lunch.

1983

Junior Church: It was noted that several of the children had a thoughtful and perceptive attitude to life and to the needs of others and one was encouraged by some of their comments and understandings. It was not always easy to see the rationale and justification for the junior church and its role needed to be thought about continually. It was agreed that the role of children in the church should be given serious thought in the coming year.

1984

Minister's Report: Wheatley Festival of Faith – the sad note is that the Festival did not turn the village on. I know the English aren't much interested in formal religion anymore. It is strange, but at the height of England's cultural and worldly power in the 17th and 19th cents, religions flourished here. This is not to say there isn't deep interest about life and death and the world to come. But when it comes to the churches, there is really very little interest. What has gone wrong?

1987

Maintenance Report: I have to say a very considerable thank you to all of you – both trousered and skirted – who have done this work. I have many vivid and amusing memories of the comradeship which we have found together and each piece of work accomplished is indelibly marked with the commitment and dedication of those who so skilfully helped. That we manage to do it is a mark of the strong sense of community in this church.




