Then there can be anxiety in allowing so much to slip through the fingers and be forgotten.

I am fortunate in having an outlet in painting for holding onto some eye catching moments. Recently my attention was caught by some quirky birds in the window of a Tudor house. I just had to draw them, do something with them, not let them slip away. In the end they became the focus of an Advent window, but as I worked on it I worried about how the design had any relevance to the season.

Only in the placing of the birds did a meaning emerge. I had found them all as individuals separated from each other by the lead of the casement window, but they needed to relate, each bird to another of a different kind. It reinforced for me the importance of engaging with others, not just like ourselves but across the barriers of age, class, sex and race.

So I leave this thought with you for Christmas and through the New Year to lift your eyes from the iPhone on your travels and find enrichment from engaging with those you meet.

### 4 Regular worship leaders in Wheatley URC by the end of 2022

During last year it became clear that we now have four of our members regularly leading worship for us on Sunday mornings. How blessed we are. Is there a danger that we might sometimes take them for granted? Brief words of appreciation and holding them in our prayers are surely the least that we should be doing.

### 3 Prime Ministers in 2022

So what, I hear some of you thinking, this is a church newsletter after all. Of course we are all too aware of how we landed up with three prime ministers in the matter of a few weeks last year. However, the result of those political upheavals is that the UK has its first non-white prime minister who also happens to be a member of the Hindu faith. So in a country where there seems to be so much intolerance and lack of trust, this does seem like some sort of tentative step forward, whatever your political leanings are, and however much faith you have in Rishi Sunak to lead our country through this most difficult of times.

# 'Commitment for Life' — making a difference in Zimbabwe



Because of drought and climate change many families in Zimbabwe find it difficult to make ends meet. Jerina Nyamukondiwa and her family are one such. They used to grow food to eat and sell, but recently crops have failed and they have gone hungry. They found themselves with little food and not enough money to send the children to school. Things were so bad that after several days without food they moved to a church compound to survive.

However, things have now improved. Jerina has been working with a Christian Aid programme which has enabled her to join the Kubatana Steelworks group where she has learned to weld. Her husband already worked as a welder. She has enjoyed having a new skill and of course the income that goes with it. Learning something not traditionally done by women has been a challenge and a joy. She says, 'Do not be intimidated by being told that this job cannot be done by women. There is no work that cannot be done by women because (they say) it is hard.'

Being part of the project has allowed Jerina to make improvements to her home and also buy livestock. 'I have my goats and my pig project. I can see that things are surely changing for me and my family'

At the steelworks the group have designed and made a water-cart which can hold several large drums. She says; 'We thought of making a water-cart as a group. Thinking about exactly what we wanted, so that if we put containers on it someone can go and fetch the water easily'.

All our giving is making a difference to people's lives from day to day.

What would a church, or life itself, be without the good times (like salmon and champagne at Church Anniversary)?

### 1996

Worship Committee: We intend to produce a card for visitors to the church, in time for the bicentenary, which will explain who we are and what we get up to (well, not everything). We are asking those responsible for the refurbishment to take account of visibility (except, of course, for what goes on behind the organ curtain) and acoustics (except for the whispered communications between organist and minister).
