#### **Covering Thoughts**

Recently I have been pondering the difference between gratefulness and gratitude.

Definitions differ, but I feel for myself that gratefulness is a state of being and a goal to reach towards in the totality of experience. We may not actually feel grateful all the time, but to accept what is happening without complaint is a step towards living in a state of gratefulness. When it works it brings contentment, tremendous wellbeing and desire to reach out to others.

That is when gratitude comes into play, for it is an outgoing expression of what we experience. It goes beyond sitting back and enjoying the feeling. Instead, it inspires us to look at nature, events and people with attention and appreciation and to share what we see.

In a pastoral letter that Laurence wrote some months ago she said how much we need to affirm others. We all know how warm it makes us feel when someone expresses their gratitude or makes a positive comment, but it does a lot for the person who does the affirming too.

Having said this is not to deny the necessity for critical debate, acknowledgment of difficulties and the need for action to correct injustice. But to attempt to bring out the good in a person or situation is a small movement towards changing attitudes, and it may have benefits for both sides in situations of conflict.

It is hard to envisage painting an abstract entitled Gratitude. However, I realize that most of my paintings are the result of experiencing gratefulness for a multitude of things, and they are my way of sharing this with others. It was anemones on sale in Thame market that brought on a recent feeling of gratefulness. This overflowed into a painting which I share with you. The title is Go Bananas!

#### Pastoral Letter

I see a pastoral letter as one that tries to offer something. At the same time, it can be a vehicle for the request of something. I hope that this letter does both.

To provide some background I am currently a student at the Urban Theology Union which is based in Sheffield where I am working for the Certificate in Theology & Discipleship for Mission. The course is validated via the Luther King Centre in Manchester. One of the key course books is *Christ in the City* by John Vincent.

The final assignment consists in a student led plan for mission.

There are lots of assumptions here, but I will press on.

Many people belong to a church but do not always believe what it stands for. Others believe but do not belong.

I have become convinced that a significant minority in many churches want to belong but finds it hard to consent to such things as the declaration of faith. There is a mission needed for this group. The Urban Theology Union argues that people were attracted to Jesus, and it was only later that they were presented with a more formal belief. At first there needs to be a step into the into the unknown. Jesus first invites people to follow him with their feet, and then share a common life. Do you hear echoes of Taizé as I do? Discipleship is a walking behind, a leaving behind, undertaken with others.

There are many places in our church where the significant minority can share their thinking and express their feelings about some of the theology that they find difficult to ascribe to. We are fortunate to have many places where this can happen including: the coffee mornings; the larder; table tennis; the quiet sessions; Sunday morning coffee; just meeting in the village.

I go to most of the above and would love to talk with you if you have questions or if you think other people might have such questions. This would be a ministry to me and in turn I might be able to provide further questions to help you. Such engagement would provide material for my final assignment. For many the people on the margins consist of those with disability and refugee status. Mine is an outreach to those on the margins of the church by choice which seems to fit in

well with the ministry of Jesus. In turn those on the margins provide a ministry to those on the inside. This raises interesting issues for an inclusive church. Meeting with those on the margins can be a tricky exercise which is why I am following the course at the Urban Theology Union.

I already have a head start with all the interviews I conducted for my dissertation on the value of congregational studies. I would love to pick up some of those interviews or to start afresh. I look forward to a mutual exchange of ministry.

The Urban Theology Union sees its methodology as both that of a participant observer as well as an observant participator. I go along with this as I know many of you do because I have learnt from you and hope to continue to do so. All theology is Contextual Theology in that it is based on living the Christian existence in a particular place, time, and culture. For us it is Wheatley URC. Whether you are in the significant minority, or the majority, join me on the journey of sharing.

I offer this pastoral letter in the context of the away day for an inclusive church.



.....yes, this was the perfect setting for the Falcon School Quiz evening on March 17th .. and what a great success it turned out to be!

An amazing total of £898 was raised from raffle proceeds and some exceedingly generous donations, including lovely food for the evening. Thank you so much to Robert and Ellen for planning and running the quiz and to everybody who attended or helped on the day.







As a result, come the end of March, we had achieved 79% of our original £3000 target, so are looking well on-track to reach our goal by early June.

We are already planning ahead with Falcon their priorities in terms of initial laptop model purchases to just get the 'Computer Lab' up and running, with Wilbert receiving a lot of welcome guidance from Kevin Snyman.

And this latest news (Times: April 11th) is a reminder of why our support for the Falcon School is so critical:

'Inflation has turned education into a luxury for Zimbabwe's parents, who (themselves) grew up as the most literate pupils in Africa. Now, with families unable to fund fees, half of school-age children have dropped out.

And shrinking wages and the high cost of living is emptying staff rooms as well as classrooms. Teaching unions estimate 300 teachers are leaving their post each month'.

Be in no doubt, our support for the Falcon School is highly appreciated!
