

Pastoral Letter

Love came down at Christmas Dear Friends,

I am writing this letter in the days following the election of the new president of the USA. What change this threshold event will have on the world we can only wonder. My gut instinct is to prepare mentally and emotionally for a more chaotic, uncertain future for us. I hope and trust that kindness, compassion and love will continue, even increase and find expression in this world. This is a sadly misused world beset by increasing uncertainty: inequality, war, political unrest, economic difficulties, climate change, and systemic injustice. It is a place (for example) where we allow the dumping of untreated sewage into our waterways thus killing off our water-based ecosystems. Planet Earth though badly served by us is our only home. It is still seeped in divine love, if we can find a place within us where we can realise it.

Thankfully, our church is committed to supporting action on social justice, equality, and compassion in the world and to the pursuit of action on climate change policy. Part of our church mission is to embrace diversity in all forms—racial, gender, economic, and theological. Our church is a centre of hospitality and warm generous welcome to all. We give thanks that all our gifts and talents go towards making it so.

Christmas is the time in the church calendar to choose to enter more consciously into an experience of hope, love, peace and joy. We can once again welcome the newborn Jesus into our inner world as well as to our communal sanctuary. During advent we engage in reflective preparation for the arrival of Jesus at Christmas time. The themes of hope, peace, joy, and love are explored in our services over this four-week period. The vulnerable infant Jesus a symbol of the divine love offered to this earth

Regardless of our diverse backgrounds and histories we are connected more closely than we often realise in spirit and body. Matthew's verse on the coming of the infant Jesus illuminates to me this aspect of the call to be in the world in a particular way (God is with us).

Behold, the virgin shall be with child and shall bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel, (which translated means, "God with us.") Matthew 1:23

I come from an Irish Catholic background which generally indoctrinated its children into an experience of God as the omnipotent Being delivering judgement and punishment, guilt, retribution (reinforced with some now very illegal teaching methods). It has always been a paradox to me that whilst God was supposed to be a God of love, what was shown and acted out by many religious professionals of that time was quite the opposite quality.

It was a sorry time for Ireland and much damage was done to its people. But there is better news! Christmas is coming again, reminding us that the presence of divine love continually provides potential to help us live more completely. In **Christina Rosetti's** beautiful poem (which has also been set to music - see YouTube) the world is infused by the Divine Mystery, Spirit, Love, Light and Peace and Wonder - God with us.

Love came down at Christmas, Love all lovely, love divine; Love was born at Christmas, Star and angels gave the sign.

Worship we the Godhead, Love incarnate, love divine; Worship we our Jesus: But wherewith for sacred sign?

Love shall be our token, Love shall be yours and love be mine, Love to God and to all men, Love for plea and gift and sign.

We all know and will have experienced that life is at times difficult and painful. Sometimes however, like today, as I write, the clouds lift, the greyness disappears, and the world becomes an intensely colourful, beautiful place again filled with grace and love and suddenly I feel more complete in the world. Given the difficulties our world presently faces even moments of such connection to God's grace can be supportive and regenerative to our spirit and mental health. Small acts of kindness, attention to personal relationship and generosity to others – and to ourselves can connect us all to God's presence in our lives.

May there be as much love in your heart when you look inwards towards your own child of history as when you behold the vulnerable infant Jesus.

We give thanks for the constant service, hard work, gifts and prayers of all our congregation which make our church such a vibrant and compassionate place to be. I hope that you are looking forward to the celebrations soon to be shared with family, friends, and at church during this Christmas period.
